Bank of Canada holds rates as uncertainty lingers

The Bank of Canada has kept its policy rate unchanged at 2.25% at its April 29th announcement, marking its fourth straight hold and leaving variable mortgage and HELOC rates steady for now.

The decision was widely expected as the Bank balances mixed signals: inflation has ticked higher due to oil-price shocks linked to the US-Iran conflict, while underlying inflation measures appear less alarming.

For borrowers, the message is stability rather than relief. After four rate cuts in 2025, the Bank has stayed in wait-and-see mode through 2026, watching whether inflation pressures fade or economic weakness deepens.

Economists remain split on the next move, but some see cuts as more likely than hikes if core inflation keeps cooling and growth softens. For homebuyers and sellers, steady rates may at least provide a clearer backdrop in an uncertain market.

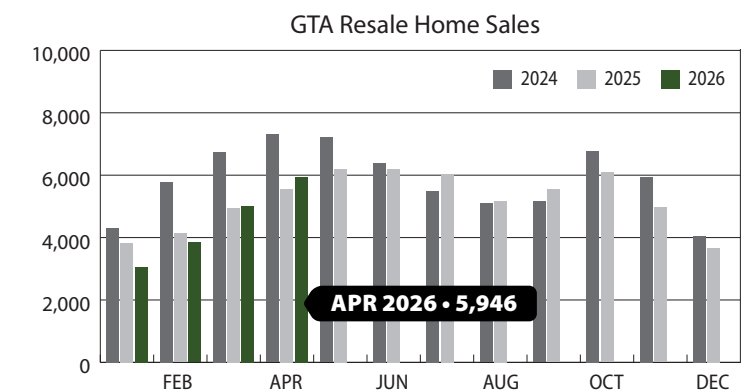
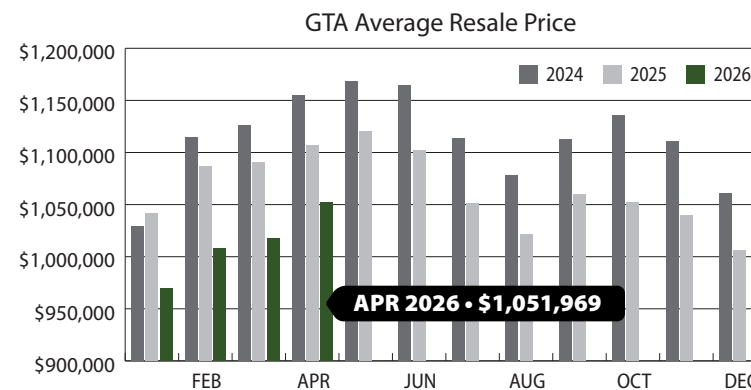

GTA HOUSING MARKET CONTINUES TO TIGHTEN IN APRIL

Market Highlights

- April sales of 5,946 units were up by 7.0% versus April 2025 while both new listings (-9.3%) and total active listings (-6.4%) declined versus last year despite remaining at elevated levels in historical terms
- This suggests that overall market conditions tightened during the first full month of spring in the GTA, which is a trend that actually began in the previous month of March
- Despite this tightening, the April MLS® Home Price Index Composite benchmark declined by 6.6% year-over-year while the average selling price was also down by 4.9% to \$1,051,969 over the same timeframe
- If market conditions continue to tighten and home prices level off (as expected), this could be a signal to home buyers who remain on the sidelines to engage in the market

What is a secondary suite?

A secondary suite is a self-contained living space within a home. It typically includes a private kitchen, bathroom, sleeping area, and a separate entrance, either private or through a shared space.

Where can you build one?

Basements, garden suites, and laneway homes are common options. However, requirements vary by municipality and may include:

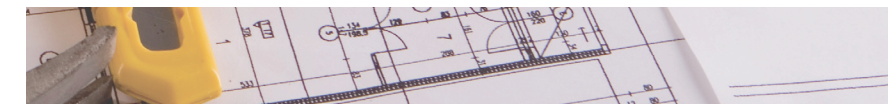
- Minimum unit size and ceiling height
- Proper bedroom windows (egress)
- Fire separation standards
- Location outside flood-prone areas

Do you need a permit?

In most cases, yes. Municipalities across Ontario and B.C. require permits to legalize a suite. The unit must pass inspections and meet building and fire code standards before it can be rented.

Bottom line

A legal secondary suite can boost property value, create rental income, and help ease housing shortages - but only if it meets all local requirements.



WHAT EVERY BUYER SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE APPRAISAL PROCESS

Appraisals are a key step in any real estate transaction. Lenders use them to determine a property's value before approving a mortgage. While buyers don't interact directly with appraisers, understanding the process can help avoid surprises.

WHY IS AN APPRAISAL NECESSARY?

An appraisal ensures the home's value supports the loan amount. This protects the lender from over-lending. If a borrower defaults and the home is worth less than the mortgage, the lender could face a loss when reselling the property.

COST AND TIMING

Although lenders order the appraisal, buyers typically pay for it. Costs vary by property type and location but often start around \$300. The on-site visit can take 30 minutes to a few hours, with the full report delivered within a few days.

WHAT DO APPRAISERS LOOK AT?

Appraisers provide an unbiased estimate of value. They assess factors like square footage, layout, condition, upgrades, and amenities. Most importantly, they compare the home to recent sales in the area and current market conditions.

WHAT IF THE APPRAISAL COMES IN LOW?

If the appraised value is below the purchase price, the lender may reduce the loan amount. Buyers can renegotiate, walk away (if protected by a condition), dispute the appraisal, or cover the gap with a larger down payment.
